The 2003-2004 academic year was a busy, challenging, exciting and productive year for students and faculty in the department of economics, accounting and business management. Enrollment in the various majors in the department continues to grow to the point where most business management classrooms in the Weller Center are now operating at maximum capacity. Our accounting and economics programs are also attracting more majors. Consistent with our vision and mission statements, we continue to revise, upgrade and improve our major programs and are very pleased with the quality and diversity of courses we make available to our students.

Two new faculty members will be joining the department for the 2004-2005 academic year. Brian Peterson, associate professor of economics at Manchester College in Manchester, Ind., has been hired in a tenure-track position to join our economics program. Brian received his B.S. degree in business administration from Dayton University and a M.A. and Ph.D. in economics from the University of Indiana in Bloomington, Ind. He comes to us with extensive teaching experience and will be an excellent addition to our economics program. Brian's position will increase the number of full-time faculty in economics from two to three. Brian was assistant professor of economics at Central College during the 1996-1997 academic year.

Dennis Pedrick, former assistant professor of marketing at Drake University and currently a consultant in private practice, has been hired as Barney Olson's replacement to teach courses primarily in the areas of management and marketing. Dennis earned an undergraduate degree in business administration from Western Kentucky University and a Ph.D. in marketing from The University of Memphis. In addition to his teaching background, Dennis has worked as a consultant to several Central Iowa businesses over the last few years. The department is delighted to have Dennis as one of its members. Thus the

department will expand from eight full-time faculty members to nine full-time faculty members for the 2004-2005 academic year: four in the management area, two in accounting and three in economics.

Jann Freed, professor of management, will return to fulltime teaching after a year-long sabbatical leave. Harry Fisher, visiting associate professor of management at Central College during the 2003-2004 academic year who was hired last year for one year to assume Jann's teaching responsibilities, has accepted a tenure-track position as associate professor of management at Eureka College, in Eureka, Ill. The department is thankful for Harry's service to Central College and its students and wishes him the best in his career choices and in life.

The department completed and launched its Web site in February of this year. We would like each and every one of you to visit our Web site at www.central.edu/eam/. The department held its annual Advisory Council meeting on April 16, 2003. Our featured speaker was Mike Orr, former CEO of John Deere Credit in Moline, Ill. Mike's presentation dealt with corporate governance

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and ethical responsibilities in American corporations. He primarily focused on Deere and Company's corporate governance structure and shared with us his personal experiences at Deere during his 22-year tenure there. A reception following the Advisory Council meeting was held at Strawtown Inn and was well attended by the department faculty as well as by the council members. Our department thanks Mike and the rest of our Advisory Council members for taking time out of their busy schedules to spend the afternoon with us and our students.



After graduating from Central College in May 1979, I moved to Iowa City, Iowa, to begin my accounting career. In July, I started working for the public accounting firm of Dee, Gosling and Co. and found out that I passed the CPA exam.

I enjoyed working for a regional CPA firm because it enabled me to experience many dimensions of public accounting, including tax preparation, audit work and general financial consulting services. After a year on the job, I decided to take advantage of the University of Iowa's educational opportunities and signed up for graduate courses. After two semesters of part-time studies, I committed to the full-time master of accounting program. As part of my financial aid, I was given the opportunity to teach introductory accounting, and I loved it!

After graduation, I accepted a position at Marshalltown Community College (MCC) teaching introduction to business, quantitative methods and introduction to computers. I eventually moved into teaching accounting courses at MCC. One day, a colleague told me that the University of Northern Iowa (UNI) was looking for someone to teach an evening accounting class. As it turned out, UNI wanted a full-time accounting instructor, and I had myself a new job. Currently, I teach an accounting Ph.D. seminar and financial statement analysis. I also love my research which focuses on non-U.S. firms' financial reporting choices. the market elements that contribute to high-quality financial reporting and market participants' use of financial information. One of my favorite quotes is that of William Hunter (1718-1783) "To acquire knowledge and communicate it to others has been the pleasure, the business, and the ambition of my life." 
